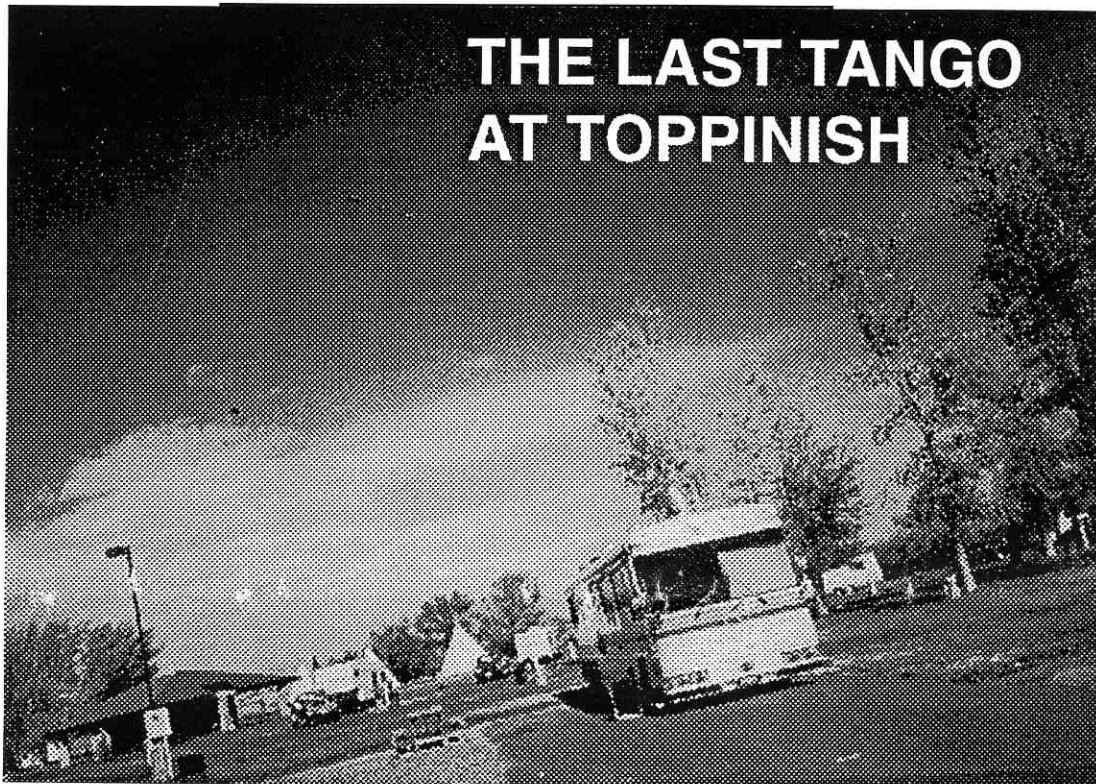

The hard-core Dipsea Netters wrapped up this summer's camping season in style with "The last tango in Toppenish," at the Yakima Indian Nation RV park.

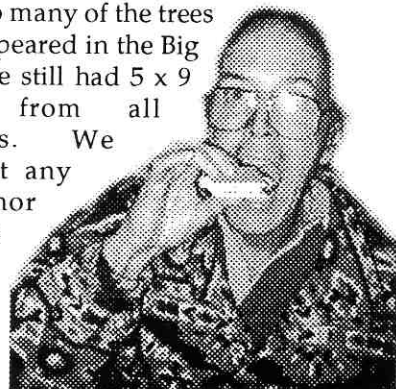

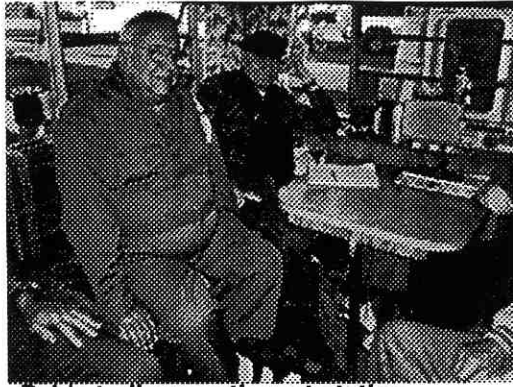
Count your blessings

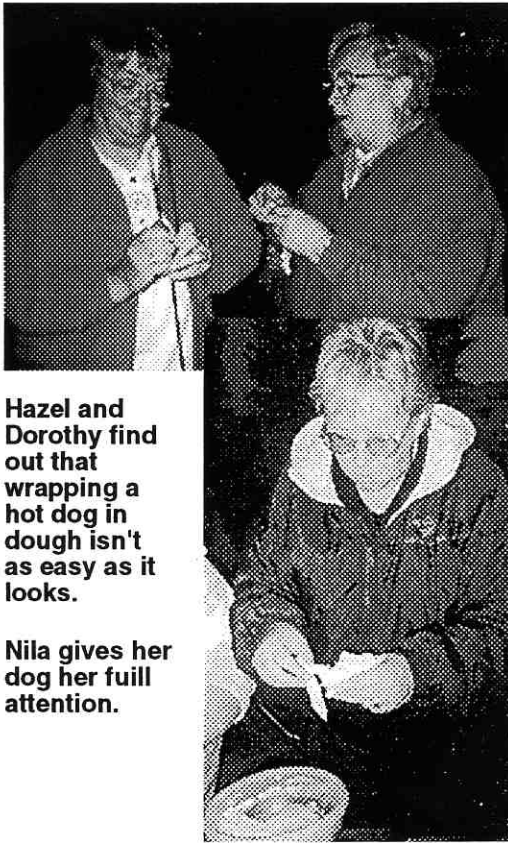

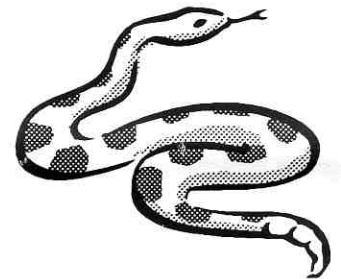

Gerry McCool, KB7HCR

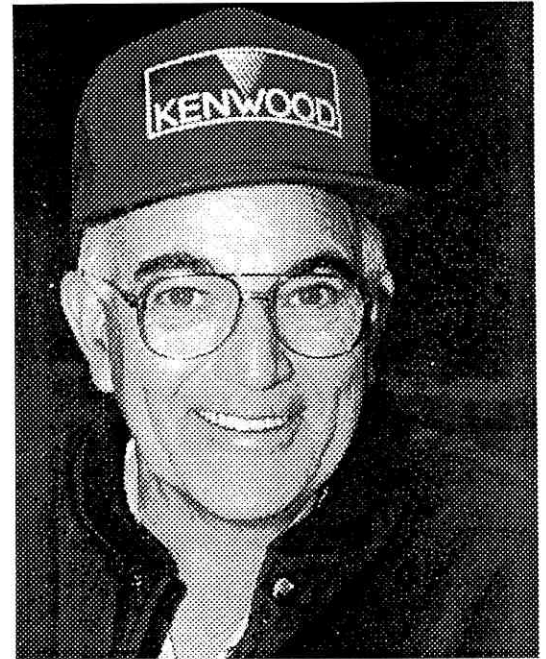
Gerry was born in San Diego, CA in 1929. His dad was in the navy. He moved to Oregon that same year. He lived in Bonny Slope (2 miles N. of Ceder Mill) from, 1930 to 44. He went to grade school there, then moved to Vernonia and went to high school there. He lived on a farm, milked cows, logged, hauled pulp logs to St. Helens. Then he worked for the Oregon American Lumber Co. for a short time as a planer feeder.

Gerry and Dorothy were married in 1948 and had 2 boys and 1 girl.

In 1950 he moved back to Bonny Slope and drove freight truck for Inland Motor Freight. In 1958 a large rock fell in front of his truck (west of Celilo Falls) the impact totaled the truck and trailer. He spent the next few years doctoring for his back.

He was sent to outboard motor school for a career change. Tiring of that (and doing many other things) in 1965 he went to work for Riviera Motors which was the NW distributor for VW/Porsche Audi. He worked for them for 19 1/2 years as a parts truck driver, started up and managed the air-conditioning shop, then traveled as a Technical Parts and Accessories Rep.

Retiring in 1985, he bought a farm in Madras, OR. (it started out with a dirt road to 160 acres of tillable ground and 160 acres of rocks and sagebrush,) Gerry also had to put in the power, a well, a septic system, house,



shop, etc. He carved a home out of the wilderness for us. They wanted \$7000. to put in the telephone line and he decided CB radio (dirty word) would keep him in touch with his son in town. But later his son told him about a ham radio class that was being taught. He and Dorothy took the class and each became a tech plus.

Orv Bailey got him started with the Dipsea Net group. From there it is history. He says what a wonderful group to belong to. Just like family. In the 90's he found a company that would put the telephone line in, over 1 mile, for \$3500. UPDATE: He just became great-grampa for the 17th time. (Yes, but can he make gravy? ed.) Dorothy, his name is Gerald on his license so I made him Gerry with a "G" instead of Jerry with a "J".

Put in kettle and simmer till vegetables are soft. Put in blender on liquify or higher and blend till no seeds or pulp show. Put back in container and add the following and

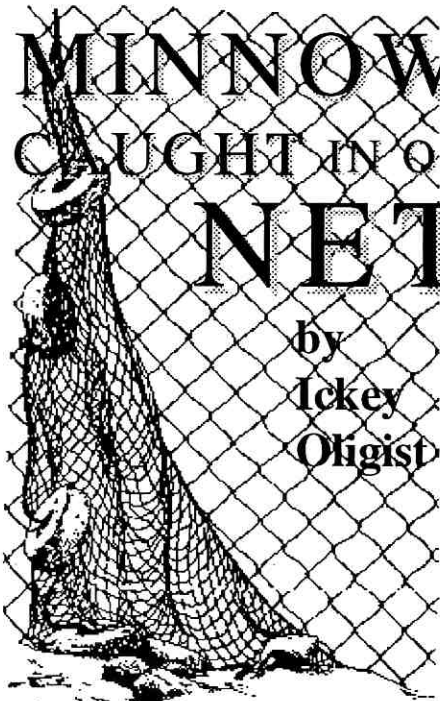
you are finished.

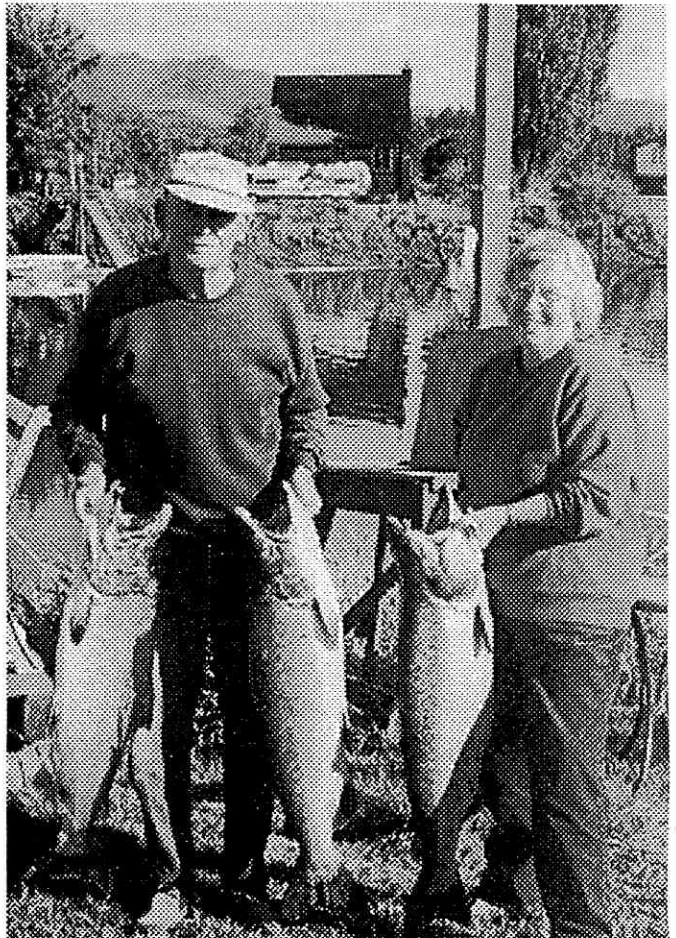

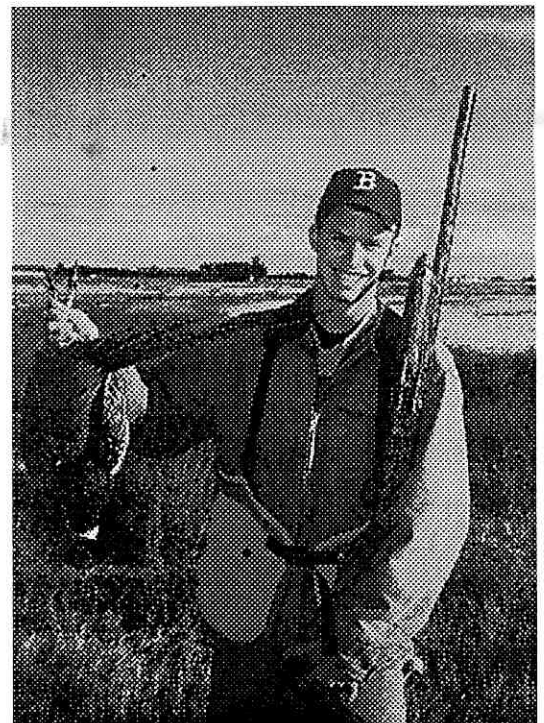

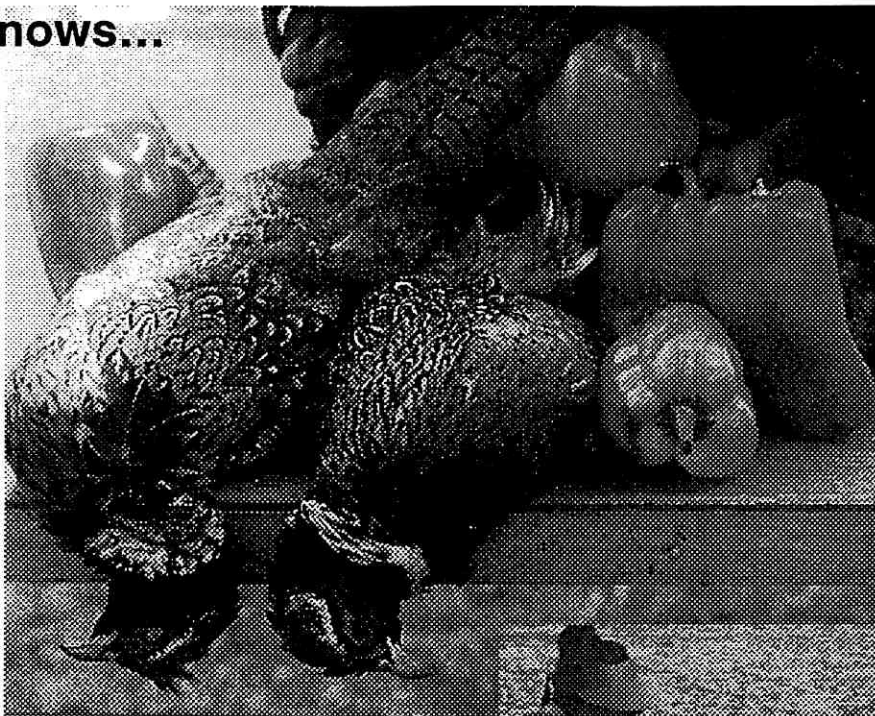
We are now safely back in Yuma. We had a good trip back with only some head wind coming through Oklahoma and Texas and New Mexico. No rain or ice or dust storms.

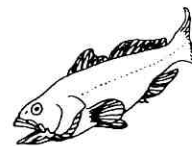

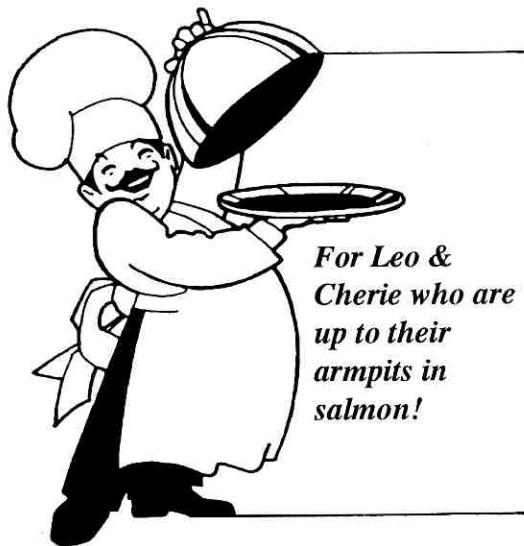

Pesto-crusted Salmon Fillets with Citrus-Soy Sauce

6 (6 oz) salmon fillets
salt & pepper
Olive oil
Pesto, recipe follows
1/2 to 3/4 cup fine bread crumbs
1 tsp unsalted butter
2 oranges, 2 grapefruit peeled and segmented
Citrus soy sauce, recipe follows
Steamed spinach leaves

Preheat oven to 350°

Heat a non-stick saute pan over high heat. Season the salmon fillets with salt & pepper. Add a small amount of oil to the pan and sear both sides of salmon quickly, just a few seconds on each side, leaving the fish very rare. Remove from the pan from the heat, and place the fish on a work surface. Wipe out the pan and reserve for later use.

Spread a 1/4 inch layer of pesto evenly over 1 side of the fillets. Sprinkle the top of pesto with a light, thin dusting of fresh bread crumbs. Carefully invert each fillet into the pan and place over medium heat. Toast the bread coating, adding tiny bits of butter to the pan that will melt the salmon underneath. Once the bread is toasted (after about one minute), place the pan in the oven for about three minutes, just to heat the fish through.

To serve, mound 1/6 of the spinach in the center of a warm dinner plate. Invert 1 salmon fillet unto the spinach, crust side up, and ladle citrus soy sauce around the sides. Place 1 orange segment on top of 1 grapefruit segment in the sauce on three different points on the plate.

PESTO:

2 tbs pine nuts
1/2 tsp chopped garlic
salt & pepper to taste
6 cups fresh basil
1/2 cup olive oil
1/2 to 3/4 cups fresh bread crumbs.
In the bowl of a food processor place pine nuts, garlic, salt & pepper. Add the basil and process again. With motor running, add oil in a slow stream, scrapping the bowl occasionally. Add the bread crumbs a little at a time, just enough to make the pesto spreadable. Process and repeat until the pesto is the right consistency. Remove and set aside until ready to use.

CITRUS SOY SAUCE

1 tbs olive oil 1/2 cup ginger, peeled and thinly sliced
1/4 cup shallots, thinly sliced
1/8 cup garlic, sliced
1 cup white wine
1/8 cup of champagne vinegar
2 tbs soy sauce
1 1/2 tbs fish sauce
1 cup grapefruit juice
1 1/2 cup orange juice
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
1 1/2 cup chicken stock, reduced to 1/2 cup
1 cup olive oil

In a non reactive saucepan, saute the ginger in 1 tbs of olive oil for 1 minute over medium heat. Add the garlic and shallot and cook for 1 minute longer. Add the white wine, vinegar, soy sauce, fish sauce and all the fruit juices. Reduce the liquid to 1 cup. Add the chicken stock, bring to boil and cook another 3 min. Strain, pushing on the solids to extract as much liquid as possible, place in a blender or processor. With motor running on low slowly add the olive oil until all the oil is incorporated.

Don't let all the preparation dissuade you from trying this dish. Once all the ingredients are measured, chopped, sliced and on hand it goes quickly. The spinach only takes 1 to 2 minutes to prepare. You can serve with french fries or thinly sliced potatoes, sauted. The recipe serves six but you can adjust to the size of your own crowd.

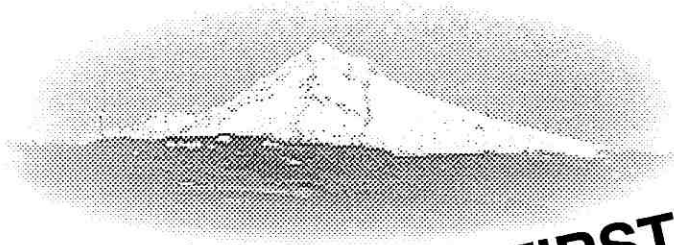

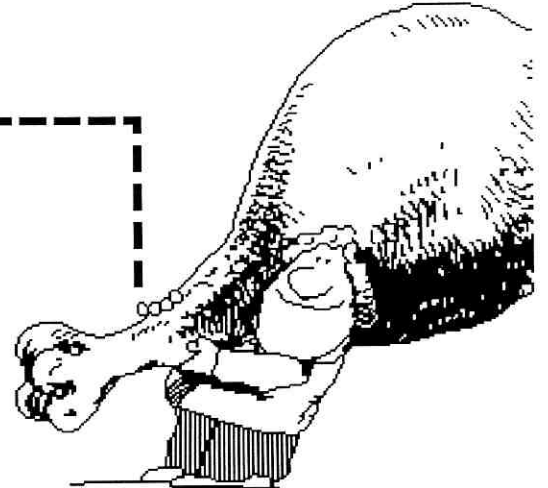
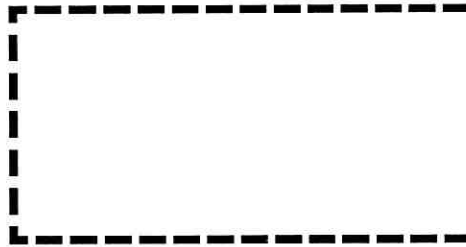
