restorative work, and to Dick and Joyce for their leadership.


What a great group of ham friends we

Warren Kenneth Follett, 84, of Elgin, died Nov. 15th at his home. He was born April 16, 1925, to Jesse King "Jay" and Florence Naomi (Hug) Follett in Elgin. He was educated at the Pine Grove School and served with the U.S. Navy. On June 18, 1945, he married Annie Lois Sanderson in Lake Providence, La.

He worked for Boise Cascade until his retirement. He was a member of the Elgin LDS Church. He was a ham radio operator and enjoyed hunting and fishing. He loved traveling and trips to Mississippi, Louisiana and Alaska.

Survivors include his wife, Annie of Elgin; daughters, Ronna Witherspoon and Jaylene Witherspoon, both of Elgin; brothers, George Follett of College Place, Wash., and Roger Follett of Elgin; sister, Betty Thompson of Elgin; eight grandchildren; 17 great-grandchildren; six step-great-grandchildren; and other relatives.

He was preceded in death by children, Craig Follett and Wendy Warren Follett; brothers, Claude Follett and Roland Follett; and sisters, Naomi Follett and Rita Hindman.

Silent Key Leo Conway W7TMI

Leo Arnold Conway was born in Vancouver, British Columbia on February 25, 1930, the son of Daniel and Hazel Van-Buskirk Conway. During his teen years he lived with his Grandma Lily and at the age of 19 he moved to Oregon and

helped his parents build a farmhouse in Buxton. The house was built using plans that Leo had designed while in high school.



After moving to Oregon and settling in the Portland area Leo worked for Eastman Kodak and Sawyers View Master. He owned Two-Way Radio Service and was a reserve sheriff deputy for Clackamas County. For 36 years Leo was a Redi-mix concrete driver, Teamster shop steward and driver instructor with Stanton Cement, Western Willamette and retiring from Ross Island Sand & Gravel in 1992. Leo was always there for his fellow teamsters; offering friendship and financial support as needed. While out on the job Leo was even known to share his lunch with anyone he saw down and out on the street.

Leo was very much an outdoorsman and had many life long hobbies including photography, reading, poetry, flying, hunting, fishing, camping, snowmobiling, radio control model aircraft, scuba diving, archery, music and amateur radio.

He played and taught the guitar, steel guitar and accordion. In the 50's there were times where he played the steel guitar live with his brother Wilfred and the band on the radio.

For over 40 years Leo was an instrument rated private Pilot, flying his own aircraft before his health grounded him.

As a Ham Radio operator for 58 years, W7TMI, Leo taught many amateur classes and was a Volunteer Examiner.

In 1950 Leo married Beverly Ann Pugh and together they raised 7 children; Judi, Jacqueline, Janette, Joyce, Leo Jr. Daniel & William. They enjoyed camping in the summer, adventures to the coast and road trips to Canada to see family. Leo and the boys enjoyed time each year on hunting trips.

This large family produced 12 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren

In 1986 Leo married Sharon Stober and his family grew to include his stepchildren

Leo was an active member of the Ham Radio DipSea Net Club, where he and Sharon enjoyed many outings with the group including campouts, snowmobile excursions in Eastern Oregon, and cycle riding in the Steens Mountains and Snake River Canyon.

Leo, together with Sharon enjoyed hunting, camping and fishing. For ten years he and Sharon spent all their free time in Garibaldi fishing the ocean, clamming and crabbing. After retiring, Leo and Sharon traveled through Alaska, camping in some of the most beautiful places they had ever seen. While there, they enjoyed clamming, fishing and sight seeing.

From 1997-2007 Leo and Sharon wintered in Portland and lived on the river in Nehalem May-October, where they fished the river and bay for Salmon.

In May 2007 Leo gave his life to the Lord while attending West Hills Christian Church with his wife Sharon.

It is with a great deal of sadness that we learned of the death of Ken, W7HRY. He died January 28th from kidney failure. He was born June 5, 1925 in Seattle, WA.

Ken retired from the Washington State Patrol in 1978, was the Director of the Thurston County Communications Dept., put the 911 system in Thurston County, and finished his career with the State of Washington General Administrator as a buyer/manager, retiring for good in 1993 to devote his time to the fun things he liked to do.


He enjoyed hamming, having had his license for 70 years of which he was so proud. While he was working he enjoyed cruising the waters of Puget Sound, and his last 16 years motor homing with the Dipsea Net. He also loved music and

was a very accomplished violinist, which few people knew, playing the piano and the organ and, of course, when spring came, he loved his flowers.

During the 54 years he lived in Olympia he was very active in the community serving as President of the Jr. Chamber of Commerce, President of the Navy League, Commodore of the Olympia Yacht Club, Commodore of the International Power Boat Association, and a very active member in the Westside Rotary Club with the exchange student program. He hosted students from Sweden, Finland and Australia.

One of the happiest times for him was only a few days before his death when Jim, NPS, patched him through to the Dipsea Net. There was no way he was going to let go of that telephone until he had talked to all of you. He did say he was sorry that he was unable to give you a history lesson!

By his side in all his endeavors was his wife of 57 years, Jo. He is also survived by three children, Karen, Doug and Christopher, KD7PKO. Chris, by the way, is working on getting Ken's call letters, so one day you may hear, "W7HRY".


